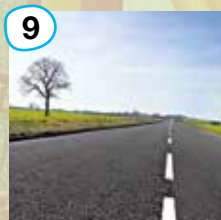

Smart pavements

When people walk on smart pavements, they generate electricity. This smart pavement is in Tokyo and thousands of people walk on it every day.



Charging stations

Bike sharing schemes

Planting flowers and trees



Plants and trees produce oxygen. They can be a home for animals and birds too. These buildings are in Milan, Italy.


Their name is *Bosco Verticale*, which means *vertical forest*. Every flat has got a big balcony with plants and trees. The water for the plants is recycled from the kitchens and bathrooms.

Hi viewers, it's Cameron here!

Lots of you asked me to post a video about what I love and hate most about living in Shetland, so...

Let's start with the bad things!

One: I really don't like it when people ask me questions like, 'Have you got electricity?', 'Have you got internet?' Duur! How do you think I do my vlog?

Two: I live in Lerwick. It's the biggest town in Shetland, but it still feels very small. There are only 7,500 people here.



Three: It's 160km to the mainland. You can go by boat or plane. It only takes an hour by plane, but that's the most expensive way to travel.

If you go by sea it can take 14 hours. And when the weather is bad, it's really scary.

Four: OK, the thing I hate most is the weather! It's the windiest place in the UK. It can be nice in the summer, but it's hardly ever warmer than 20°C.

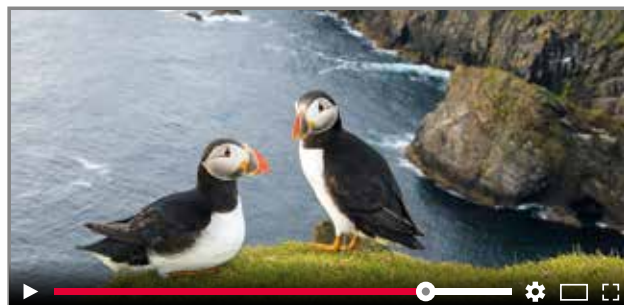
OK, on to the things I love...

One: Shetland is so far north that we can see the aurora borealis (we call it the northern lights) every year. It's the most beautiful thing to see here!

Two: We've got some of the most spectacular scenery in the UK. There are lots of cliffs, caves and beautiful sandy beaches. My favourite is St Ninian's beach. It's got sea on both sides!



Three: We've got some amazing animals and birds here. The most popular animals for tourists are the puffins and the seals, but we've also got the biggest population of otters in Europe.



Four: For me the best thing about Shetland is the culture. There are festivals for music, food, cinema and literature. But the most amazing festival is called Up Helly Aa. There's nothing like it anywhere!

The Vikings are coming!



This week I'm here in Lerwick to report on the festival of Up Helly Aa, which happened yesterday. It was amazing!

Up Helly Aa takes place on the last Tuesday in January every year. It started in the 1880s when the Shetlanders wanted to celebrate their Viking

history. It's now Europe's biggest festival of fire. More than 5,000 tourists came to see it this year.



The most interesting part of the festival yesterday happened in the evening when they had a big procession. They turned all the lights off in Lerwick and carried burning torches. They pulled the Viking ship through the town with everyone watching. Then they set fire to it. It was great!



It takes a year to prepare for the festival. There are forty different groups of people involved. Each group is called a squad. They have to design their own costumes. They also build a full-size Viking ship. It takes four months to make.



After that, the squads went around the town visiting different halls. At each one, they had to sing a song or do a dance to entertain the people. The party went on until the next morning. Today, everyone in Lerwick is sleeping!
